# **Consuelo's Story**

Consuelo's parents were divorced when she was five, causing major instability in her life. She bounced around homes, and for many years she was emotionally abused by her stepmom. In 8th grade, Consuelo was already vaping, resulting in heavy exposure to marijuana in her sophomore year of high school. She struggled with self-harm, suicidal ideation, drug use as a coping mechanism, and was eventually hospitalized. It seemed like she couldn't get out of the endless cycle of smoking every day, failing school, and falling into depression. When everything seemed like it was falling apart, her family found Hope Harbor.

When she first came into the program, Consuelo was fresh out of the hospital. The cuts on her arms were just scabbing over and her body was still recovering from the marijuana and nicotine she had fed to it for so long. Consuelo felt like she was building herself up from ground zero... and build she did. Through family counseling, Consuelo and her parents were able to talk through their emotions and feelings in a healthy manner. A church small group leader helped lead her to Christ, praying that Consuelo would see that God had been there all

consuelo would see that God had been the along, even in her struggles and tears. Our House Parents, Donna and Steve showed her unconditional love, especially when she messed up. Steve became the picture of what a gentle and kind father should look like to her.

Consuelo says, "Hope Harbor is a great program. It's very loving. When you first get here, you'll hate it. You'll be mad at everyone for the first few weeks. But once you get over yourself, you realize that this is literally all of for you. No one is trying to bring you down. Everyone is trying to set you up for success so that you can thrive in life."

I count it an immense privilege to witness God's sovereignty, power, and mercy in the work that he is doing in and through Hope Harbor. 2022 has been a year full of wonderful changes and challenges. Because of your steadfast generosity, we have been able to offer critically-needed preventative services such as a safe home environment, nurturing live-in house parents, individual and family counseling, academic encouragement and support, life skills trainings, delicious home-cooked meals, and family reunification to teens in crisis. Looking forward to 2023, I cannot wait to see how the Lord will continue to use and guide our staff, as well as the teens and their families. With God's providence and your support, we know that Hope Harbor will continue to have a meaningful influence on our community, inspiring and preparing our teens to unlock their potential to go out and




